THE202 Decoding Deception

2 credits

Course Description:

With hundreds of Christian denominations with differing beliefs and untold numbers of cults and false religions, how can we possibly be sure that what we believe is true? How can we know if we are being told the truth or we are being deceived?

In this course, we will explore two major errors that may entice believers, comparing them to true Christianity. And more importantly, we will discover how to receive revelation truth through the logos and rhema of God, through biblical meditation and the direct communication of the Spirit to your heart.

- State and discuss the three keys to the anointing according to Galatians 5:6.
- Discuss the importance of having only a godly imagination.

Course Requirements

- 1. Listen to or watch the entire teaching series *Decoding Deception*. Follow along and take notes in your PowerPoint Workbook. These notes are for your benefit and will not be submitted to your instructor. Complete all related exercises given in the lesson. <u>These exercises will all be submitted to your instructor.</u>
- 2. Prayerfully read the entire text *Hearing God Through Biblical Meditation* as assigned. (NOTE: You will not read the chapters in order.) Answer all the "Reflect" questions and "Meditation Prompts." **IMPORTANT**: Though the "Reflect" questions and "Meditation Prompts" are not written as such, be sure that you use two-way journaling to answer them whenever appropriate.

You will be told in each lesson which assignments you will are to submit to your instructor. <u>Pay attention to the Assignment Schedule so you prepare the required work in a way that can be easily submitted to your instructor by email.</u>

- 3. Prayerfully read the entire text *Am I Being Deceived?* as assigned. (NOTE: You will not read the chapters in order.) You will be given the exercises for this text in each lesson, so pay attention to the Assignment Schedule. These exercises will be submitted to your instructor.
- 4. Earn at least a B on the Final Test.

5.	Write a Final Paper which discusses what the Lord has shown you through the course about how to live free from deception. This paper is to be 3-4 pages in length and is due in the final lesson.

Standards for Grading Assignments

As indicated below, "C" or 2.0 level work is considered average. Leaders are not average people. You are therefore expected (required) to put forth the effort necessary to demonstrate at least "B" (3.0) level work or higher on all assignments which you submit. Any which do not will be returned to you with input from your instructor on how you can raise your grade to the expected level. A course grade will not be given until your assignments demonstrate that you have understood the material presented in the course and allowed your life to be transformed by the Spirit and the Word studied — the requirements for attaining a "B".

Your individual assignments (notebooks, tests, reports) will be graded according to the following standards. These grades will be averaged together to determine your course grade. Remember, we are training leaders and leaders are above-average people. Your work will reflect that.

- "D" Indicates barely passing work that is inferior to the average both in quantity and in quality.
 - Manifests a lack of initiative or sense of responsibility or both.
- "C" Average work; either steady work of an acceptable quality, or work of a high quality which is uneven, irregular or fragmentary.
 - May be mechanically or outwardly correct but shows little reflection upon or personal assimilation of the material.
- "B" Intelligently has fulfilled the requirements of this course.
 - Understands the subject matter presented and has applied it to his life in a limited manner but has not really made the truths his own.
- "A" Grasped the material with thoroughness, industry and correctness of detail.
 - Made the material his own by thinking about it and integrating it, using originality, natural ability, and insight.
